Films that pass the bechdel test

While some films may not be exemplary models of feminism, "The Girl with the Dragon Tattoo" features a female lead character with her own narrative trajectory. Historically, Hollywood has struggled to provide meaningful diversity in its representation of women, often relying on tokenism rather than genuine inclusivity. Many movies still feature women according to sexist stereotypes or outdated narratives. The Bechdel-Wallace Test, a widely used metric for female representation, measures unintentional bias and representational imbalance in fictional narratives. To pass the test, a film must feature two named female characters who have a conversation about something other than a man. This criteria may seem straightforward, but its application reveals some surprising results. Films like "Hidden Figures" clearly demonstrate strong themes of female agency and identity, while others, such as "American Pie 2", pass the test due to problematic stereotypes rather than genuine representation. A brief exchange between two women about nothing crucial to the plot is basically the minimum standard. But I'd still choose a movie that doesn't pass the Bechdel-Wallace Test over a shallow portrayal of a strong female lead any day. Lord of the Rings failed the test, yet Eowyn's "I am no man" line remains iconic. It's surprising how poorly some films can fail this test - take the entire Lord of the Rings trilogy, for instance. Despite 11 hours and 36 minutes of content, meaningful interactions between female characters only add up to less than 30 seconds on screen. Some tests may have low bars to pass, but many films that should pass still don't meet expectations. Even Bechdel acknowledges audiences shouldn't be too rigid. The test itself is flawed but serves as a thought experiment for gender representation in fictional narratives rather than the definitive standard it's often made out to be. If a main character in a film belongs to the LGBTQIA+ community but isn't solely defined by their identity, it might be considered "passing" according to GLAAD's test, The Villarreal Test. This involves avoiding stereotypical portrayals of women and instead showing them as complex individuals with various roles and characteristics. For example, if a female lead is introduced in the first scene but later displays multiple traits such as being a mother or someone in authority, the film can redeem itself. Multiple tests like The Waithe Test, which evaluates power dynamics for Black women, and The Ko Test, which focuses on non-white characters' representation, are also used to measure inclusivity. The concept of Frozen highlights that female characters are not limited to simply being passive or objectified, but can be complex and multidimensional. The movie's focus on Elsa and Anna's relationship showcases their struggles with emotional control and the consequences it has on the kingdom. In contrast, the 2002 film Chicago features two strong female leads who drive the plot forward despite the male-dominated narrative. The characters' conversations about their love for each other and their survival serve as a testament to their agency and strength. Similarly, the dystopian movie Children of Men defies traditional stereotypes by presenting a complex portrayal of women in positions of power. The character of Kee is central to the story, and her pregnancy serves as a catalyst for the plot's progression. Lastly, Kill Bill Vol 1 and 2 feature a female protagonist who embodies strength and determination. Despite being pregnant, The Bride remains a force to be reckoned with, taking down assassins and working towards her revenge against Bill. The film Ghost World explores the complex friendship between Enid and Becky as they navigate their lives after high school.
